Minutes of the NETA meeting at the ANG national seminar in Tucson AZ

September 13, 2006

The meeting was called to order by John Waddell, president. He thanked the ANG board for taking the time to be present. Mary K. Campbell talked about the website, and encouraged members to use the resource. John announced that the Directory will be printed in January. In the past, ANG and EGA have made this available to their chapters, and we hope this will continue.

The minutes of last year's meetings were published in the Journal, and no changes were noted.

A treasurers' report and a budget were distributed by Pat Donaldson, treasurer. Joan Thomasson moved that the budget be adopted. The motion was seconded and passed.

John opened a discussion regarding questions that Carol Dam, VPO of EGA asked him to bring forward. The questions are quoted here and comments from the group are listed:

- Please share you reactions to submitting your proposals digitally if that is an option. EGA Seminar 2008 plans to use this as an option. Teachers may also send proposal packets through the mail as they always have if preferred.
- 1. Be sure that your recipient can receive what you send in the format in which you are sending it.
- 2. You surrender control of how your proposal looks to the recipient. This might be solved by sending as a PDF, but you would still wonder about the color of pictures, etc.
- 3. Your proposal is not returned to you (like paper proposals would be) and that is a concern because this is proprietary information what happens to the printouts?
- 4. You can't put in threads/stitch samples -
- 5. Could probably send jpegs only of pictures
- 6. Would the proposals sent the traditional way look better with real threads etc.?
 - Would you find submitting via e-mail

- attachment helpful or unhelpful? Why?
- 1. Would save postage costs but if they don't look as good as a traditional proposal, they might not be accepted.
- 2. Would be quicker and more efficient.
- Would you feel comfortable submitting your own digital photographs for seminar brochures if that is an option?
- 1. Skill of the photographer is crucial. Could we have authorized or recommended photographers?
- 2. The pictures in the brochure will not all be of the same quality; several teachers were very much opposed because of this
- 3. When you photograph it yourself, you have more control of what/how your piece is photographed. (i.e., right side up, color corrected, important in 3-D pieces). Other teachers thought it was a good idea because of this. It was noted that if you are not a photographer, you can have your piece professionally photographed. This is a cost, but you have the pictures to use in your handouts.

Question: Wouldn't it be nice if teachers could use the wonderful photographs that Mike McCormick does for ANG? Answer: Sunwest Publishing owns the copyright to those. (contact: sunwestpub@aol.com) It was noted that in the past the cost of buying the right to make copies has been prohibitive, but some teachers have paid Mike to photograph items privately for them at his studio and the cost is reasonable.

(m3photo@sbcglobal.net) Jennifer Taylor also does wonderful photography.

(taylored@needleartworks.com) Suggestion: article for Journal on sources for professional photography for needlework

- Are there other ways that we can assist teachers and cut unnecessary expenses for teachers and committees using technology?
- 1. NETA should develop a kit packing machine. <much laughter>
- 2. Use of cell phones and email cuts long distance and postage costs
- 3. Post portfolio on website rather than sending traditional proposals

Suggestion from a member that the national seminars use the per diem amounts specified by the federal government for teachers. The organization would not specify an amount in the contract but would use words like 'the then-current federal per diem amount for the location of the seminar'. Discussion ensued.

It was noted that seminars needed to know the cost of per diem specifically to set seminar fees. It was noted that ANG raised the per diem in the spring before this seminar in response to the expense of the location even though seminar fees had already been set. It was asked if this would be in judging contracts as well. It was suggested that travel days be covered at 75%. Travel days are now covered at 100% by ANG, so it was noted that this would not be an improvement!

Suggestion that we start an email list for NETA members, probably a Yahoo group. This would be voluntary, but would be a site where issues could be discussed between meetings. Elizabeth Talledo moved that we form such a list, and the motion was seconded and passed.

Discussion of ANG/EGA national seminar scheduling. The 2007 seminars are back to back and the 2008 seminars actually overlap. Janet Fishel, former president of ANG, said that she signed the 2007 ANG contract knowing it was back-to-back with EGA, but it was the only dates they could find, the process having been somewhat delayed. It was noted that the early Sept/late Aug dates are cheaper in resort hotels and ANG and EGA are competing for the same locations. It was commented that EGA is scheduled way out and ANG should make a point of not scheduling back to back. Also, they should be careful of religious holidays. John noted that many participants would like to go to both seminars, but not back to back. Scheduling the seminars this way forces the participants to choose, thus lowering attendance. Teachers who submit to both are forced to choose as well. Sandy Arthur, Director of Seminars for ANG said that the seminars are not back to back in 2009.

NETA was asked to post a schedule of future

seminars on our website. EGA has a really good listing, as well.

This issue will be discussed at the ICNA meeting in October, which John and Carole will both attend.

Issue of visas for international teachers: Several of our international teachers have asked us for help since it's very difficult to get visas to teach in the US. It was pointed out that this is a legal issue. The number of professionals coming in to the US is limited. It was suggested that we write our congressmen and point out that this is a little different since we are working for nonprofit organizations. Perhaps it should help that we are an educational organization do universities and symphonies have this problem? It was also pointed out that we are the people protected by the law, as it is we who might not be hired if an international teacher was. Those at the meeting said overwhelmingly that they were opposed to this notion as we have much to learn from the international teachers. We will work toward a solution on this, but in the meantime if anyone has any ideas, contact John (jkwaddell@pdq.net).

Discussion of Universal Cover Sheets. The original idea, proposed by NETA, was to have one standard reusable cover sheet so that we don't have to redo it every time we send in a proposal. The following suggestions were made:

- 1. We need a usable document -- one we can type into the form and print it out. PDFs are great but you have to handwrite them or recreate the form. Could we have the form posted in one place? And seminars link to it? Like on the NETA website?
- 2. There have been small changes on the forms which make them not reusable, such as having the name of the seminar at the top of the form and a space to fill in the date. This is not important info.
- 3. The lines are too narrow to write between and the spaces are too small to put the information requested.
- 4. The check boxes at the top (2 day, 4 day, etc., and beginner, intermediate, etc.) are not structured so that you can easily tell where to put your check mark. Circle the answer would work or lists.
- 5. Someone on a faculty committee said they would continued on the next page

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like to have the new/encore question at the top.

This will be discussed at the ICNA meeting, and seminar faculty committees have been asked for their input.

Carol Korman, President of ANG, asked that we ask for suggestions for what teachers would like from ANG. The following suggestions were made:

- 1. per diem at federal rate (discussed previously)
- 2. don't schedule back to back EGA/ANG (discussed previously)
- 3. naming a substitute teacher -- we'd like to be consulted and help choose our sub, but naming one in the contract is too soon
- 4. would like to have per diem money up front when half kit fees are paid -- we used to get both per diem and 3/4 kit fees and this has been reduced -- we're fronting a lot of money to come to seminar and this is a hardship for all
- 5. arrange for a master account rather than reimbursing teachers for hotel bills later (ANG is the only seminar we are aware of that does this) 6. arrange for the hotel to print a receipt for the teacher in advance of checkout for use in being reimbursed (this helps even with a master account) 7. if we ship a piece to ANG for exhibit, ANG should pay to return it. This year we were required to provide a prepaid shipping label. It was explained that everyone entering the exhibit had to provide the prepaid label because this made it much easier to ship the pieces out of the hotel for the exhibit volunteers. (later: an ANG board member that asked if we were asked to provide a prepaid shipping label and then were reimbursed for it when we were paid for seminar, would that work, and it was agreed that
- 8. The expense of expo tables was brought up. ANG has the most expensive Expo tables of any seminar. EGA's is a whole day and it's half the price. It was noted that seminar attendees do not subsidize Expo. Carol Korman explained that the cost of expo tables helps subsidize other seminar expense. It was suggested that there be a tiered price structure, and that teachers receive favorable treatment by being

this was a great compromise position)

- given a lower price for Expo tables. This would benefit both teachers and attendees, since more teachers would participate. Teachers generally are not selling huge amounts of stuff, so the current price keeps some from participating at all.
- 9. It was asked that ANG try to obtain a single sales tax license so that all Expo participants do not have to register separately. It was noted that this is not allowed everywhere.
- 10. Teachers should be provided banquet tickets. (ANG is the only seminar that does not do this.) It's embarrassing to teachers not to be invited to the banquet which is how it feels when ANG doesn't provide tickets. Students are beginning to notice that most teachers do not attend unless they are required to be present for MTP.
- 11. Add teacher names to class pieces in the exhibit.
- 12. This seminar:
- a. The FAQ newsletter that the Rees Group sent out was great.
 - b. Photos and bios in the handbook were great
 - c. The SFC at this seminar were the best ever.
- d. The staff at this hotel has been very accommodating.
- 13. Registration fees at this seminar were waived if a teacher wants to take a class. That changes in the Baltimore contract. We think ANG should support continuing education by allowing teachers to sign up for classes (paying the kit fee of course) on a day when we are not teaching. Teachers would sign up several months after premiere registration so that participants could all get their first choice.
- 14. ANG should pay to return class pieces (discussed above).
- 15. ANG would benefit from a shorter, more concise, less adversarial contract. It seems that in recent years when a problem has arisen, ANG has added preventive contract clauses to the contract. Over the years, the contract has become unwieldy and downright scary. If there is a problem with a particular teacher, deal with him/her individually rather than punishing all the teachers.

There being no further discussion, John thanked the ANG board for their patience and for

providing meeting space for us. Members were introduced.

Nominations were opened for Vice President. Silence ensued. The job description was stated and volunteers were encouraged to contact John.

The meeting was adjourned. The next meeting will be Thursday, October 26, 2006 at the EGA National Seminar in Richmond, VA.

Minutes of the NETA meeting at the EGA national seminar

The NETA meeting at the EGA national seminar in Richmond VA was called to order by John Waddell at 11:45am on Thursday, October 26, 2007. There was excellent attendance and we thanked EGA's Seminar Chairman for making a room available for our meeting.

The plight of the international teachers was discussed. Visas are a difficult problem and it was suggested that we each write our congressperson. NETA will try to work on this in the coming year.

A discussion of per diem payments was also held, with many feeling that this should be tied to the government rate, which varies by location.

EGA is moving toward allowing digital submissions. It was suggested that forms that could be filled out and saved (rather than PDFs) would facilitate this. NETA will check into how to make PDFs work for this. The ICNA cover sheet will be discussed and revised at the next ICNA meeting.

Carol Dam, VPO for EGA, asked us to discuss digital submission of proposals (ie by email attachment). The following comments were made:

- 1. you would lose color control and format control; much would depend on the receiving printer
- 2. would take more time and cost for the faculty committee to download and print
 - 3. no physical piece or thread card could be

enclosed, though they could be scanned

- 4. Would these proposals look less professional than those in nice binders?
- 5. These must be printed out for SFC manipulation, they wouldn't just be looking at the computer
- 6. Faculty chairman would not be mailing these back, so you might have some things out there floating around.
- 7. What if they put the wrong photo with the proposal?
 - 8. Will the colors be accurate?
 - 9. Texture won't show up
 - 10. What if it's lost in space?

Carol Dam also asked us to discuss submitting our own photos. Some were very much in favor of this as you have more control over the way your piece is shown. Some were not in favor because the prefer a professional and don't want that added expense. Also, there could be a conflict with 'online conflict' at the printer. Opinions were definitely mixed.

Discussion was opened for questions. One member suggested that the fee we are paid be called an honorarium rather than salary as we are independent contractors.

Seminar scheduling was discussed; ANG scheduled their seminars next to EGA's, which were scheduled much earlier. All the groups will be more aware of this in the future.

It was moved that we set up up a Yahoo group for members who want to belong. Passed.

Nominations were opened. Meredith Barnhill Willett was nominated for Vice President. Balloting will be in the next Journal.

The Directory will be published in January and will only include those members whose dues are current.

No further business being brought forward, the meeting was adjourned.

"Behind the Scenes with ANG"

At the Tucson NETA meeting, our guest at lunch, Carol Korman, ANG president, asked for suggestions for what the teachers would like from ANG. While many items were brought forth for discussion, several of the major issues had already been discussed at the meeting and were not reintroduced. The "wish list" as it came to be dubbed by ANG is included in the minutes elsewhere in this newsletter. and became instantly carved in stone.

On October 3, ANG formed a committee composed of President Carol Korman, Treasurer Nancy Wedemeyer, and Sceretary JoAnn Jackson to explore some of the issues brought up at our meeting. NETA President John Waddell and President-elect Carole Lake asked me to represent NETA on that committee.

The items listed in the minutes were tackled one by one. Some of the items were easily solved. Some involved lots of research, reams of email, and a lot of thought by the committee. The first two items (Federal per diem guidelines for a given Seminar city and scheduling the major seminars back to back) were discussed in the minutes.

Although naming our own seminar substitues in case of illness, etc. at a seminar would be nice, it is just not feasible in emergency situations always. The SFC would be happy to have your suggestions, but we all agreed that item should not be part of the contract. Setting subs names in contracts two years out made little sense.

The need to simplify the seminar contract was thoroughly discussed. Sample teacher contracts from other venues were examined and considered as to possible changes. The Indian Wells contract has not yet been written and all of the information gathered will be passed along to the SFC according to Carol Korman before they write it. The Baltimaore contract will not be changed in anyway "barring national catastrophe".

We explored the idea of an ANG Master hotel

account like EGA, NAN, and Callaway provide. Nancy Wedemeyer summarized the answer this way:

"I can address at least one of your issues immediately. Although we would like to put the teachers on the master account, the hotel has the final say in whether they will do that. I believe EGA teachers are entitled to 50% of a room cost only and that is easy for a hotel to handle, as is 100% coverage. Unfortunately, we are not able to provide 100% coverage for all our teahcers because of the cost involved. On the other hand, we also have those who receive 75% coverage, but if they share a room, they are only entitled to 50% reimbursement. We've also had teachers who've reserved a more costly room, and either shared the room or been the only occupant. In the last few years, the hotels we've used have been unwilling to deal with all the intricacies of our pay scale, and we feel it unfair to add some teachers to a master account and not others. The hotels also balk at the concept of printing our bills before a party h as left the hotel. Although the Starr Pass finally did that for the teachers, they then had to go back into the computer and cancel out all those transactions so a "real" final bill could be printed when you actually checked out. We cannot force the hotels to violate policies they have in place, nor do we want to cause so many problems for them that they do not want us back sometime in the future".

We then ran a sample poll of the Baltimore Faculty to see if those teachers - some NETA members and some not, would be willing to go to a 50% room reimbursement regardless of the number of days teaching, in order to use a Master Hotel Billing Account, and the answer was an overall "no". Some of the teachers who were working 5 or more days, eligible for a private room were willing to change; but, most felt they needed the downtime to organize, relax and be at their best in the classroom that a private room offered. ANG required 100% of the faculty to go to 50% reimbursement with a

roommate in order to set up a Master Account, so that will not happen for Balitmore.

We asked about per diem being paid up front so you could actually eat at the hotel. Nancy also investigated this item and her response was:

"I have tried to find some history on the fact that part of the per diems were paid in advance, but haven't found anyone who can say why this practice was stopped. The last time I can find this occurred was for 2001 Seminar, and it appears it was issued along with a travel reimbusement, if requested. However, the the practice of reimbursing air- fare in advance is still available to all teahcers."

As of now, ANG is planning to pay 75% of the kit fees up front and pay the per diem with the teaching fees.

"Expo" tables were expensive this year - enough to keep many smaller vendors from participating, and having to open both city and state tax accounts was a hassle. We had asked for a review of the pricing structure at Expo and if ANG could open a one-time event tax account to include all vendors. After lots of phone calls, exploring the state tax sites, and emailing, it was ascetained that neither Maryland (Baltimore) nor California (Indian Wells) will permit umbrella tax license, so vendors will need to take care of that issue themselves. ANG has agreed to review the pricing for tables for all participants.

On requiring a prepaid return shipping label for exhibit piece, it really made the lives of the exhibit staff so much easier. ANG will reimburse faculty exhibit pieces' shipping costs with a receipt from the shipper (UPS, FEDEX, U.S. Mail).

Banquet tickets will continue to be offered to the faculty at cost or close to it. ANG is just asking that teachers indicate which banquets they wish to attend so ANG can get an accurate head count. Last year ANG paid for \$ 4000.00 worth of meals that were not eaten between the two banquets - not just teachers, but also students who left early or did not show for one reason or other.

The exhibit booklet will be reviewed prior to

publication to be sure teacher's names are added to "class" category entries.

Some issues were not resolved such as teachers taking empty spaces available once regular registration has passed for continuing education. We have not had to register for the seminar in the past, just pay the kit fees as the classroom teacher will have already been hired, class space provided, and teacher's lodging taken care of. This changed with the Baltimore contract requiring teachers wishing to take a class to pay the registration fee. This is not resolved to my knowledge.

So, what do we have to show for countless hours of thought, piles of emails, and writers cramp? I think we have made progress. At least there is a dialogue going on and each of us has tried to see where the other is coming from. That may be the biggest accompishment of all. For the most part the major constraint in every discussion is money. Thanks to John and Carole for their insightful comments along the way, and to all the faculty members for their speedy responses and input to the survey.
